***Dragons in a Bag* by Zetta Elliott, ill. by Geneva B**

In Brooklyn, nine-year-old Jax joins Ma, a witch who lives in his building, on a quest to deliver three baby dragons to a magical world, and along the way discovers his true calling.

***Inkling* by Kenneth Oppel, ill. by Sydney Smith**

When an inkblot, who can write, listen, learn, and draw, jumps out of Mr. Rylance's sketchbook, Ethan believes he may be the answer to their problems and names him Inkling.

***Mr. Penguin and the Lost Treasure* by Alex T. Smith**

Aspiring Professional Adventurer Mr. Penguin and his colleague, Colin the spider, try to find a treasure buried in The Museum of Extraordinary Objects before bandits do.

***Other Words for Home* by Jasmine Warga**

A gorgeously written, hopeful middle grade novel in verse about a young girl who must leave Syria to move to the U.S.

***Over the Moon* by Natalie Lloyd**

To save her younger brother from being forced to work in the mines, twelve-year-old Mallie pretends to be a boy and learns to ride and train flying horses.

***Shouting at the Rain* by Lynda Mullaly Hunt**

Delsie loves tracking the weather, living with her grandmother, and the support of friends and neighbors, but misses having a "regular family," especially after her best friend outgrows her.

***Sweep: The Story of a Girl and Her Monster* by Jonathan Auxier**

In nineteenth-century England, Nan Sparrow, ten, works as a "climbing boy," aiding chimney sweeps, but when her things end up in a fireplace, she unwittingly creates a golem.

***The Unteachables* by Gordon Korman**

Over the course of a school year, room 117, with "unteachable" students and an initially uncaring teacher will experience mayhem, destruction--and maybe even a shot at redemption.

A Wolf Called Wander

by Rosanne Parry, ill. by Mónica Armijo

Based on a true story, a lost wolf cub journeys 1000 miles across the Pacific Northwest, dealing with forest fires, hunters, highways, and hunger before finding a new home.

***The Bell Rang* by James Ransome**

A young slave girl witnesses the heartbreak and hopefulness of her family and their plantation community when her brother escapes for freedom.

***Birdie* by Eileen Spinelli**

Twelve year old Birdie, coping with the death of her father, finds her world is changing and learns that change can be painful but also beautiful.

***Lion of the Sky: Haiku for All Seasons* by Laura Purdie Salas, ill. by Merce Lopez**

Haiku meets riddles in poems that celebrate the seasons.

***Predator and Prey: A Conversation in Verse* by Susannah Buhrman-Deever, ill. by Bert Kitchen**

See both sides of the story of predators and their prey with poems (many for 2 voices) accompanied by realistic illustrations.

***Sometimes You Fly* by Katherine Applegate, ill. by Jennifer Black Reinhardt**

A simple poem about encouragement, filled with realistic humor and insight into the effort behind any meaningful accomplishment in life.
